Observing that such fine points apparently had some meaning, another juror decided to come forward. He admitted that he spoke French but no English language in which the case was being tried and was dismissed.


Then a third juror spoke, saying that

Silvana Burnett saved Freddie, the cross-breed Maltese poodle's life and Freddie returned the favour. Burnett, an asth-





Fish Baiting Instructions

Here goes:


- 1. Decide if you want to bait with worms or minnows.





Bar-B-Q TIPS




At this time of the year many now are activating the barbee, only to find the propane flow is




